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BACKGROUND of QAFELA

Quick-Change Association for Educational Promotion, Livelihood Development and Awareness (QAFELA) is a Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) working in Swat, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Pakistan. As the name suggests, "QAFELA" means "traveling together for peace and prosperity" by addressing conflict, calamities, and the various resources that contribute to community development. QAFELA is a voluntary, not-for-profit organization dedicated to social and economic development, with due regard for ecological conservation, gender mainstreaming, and social protection, particularly focusing on underdeveloped areas.

The founding members of QAFELA possess extensive experience in social development, engineering, participatory development, gender mainstreaming, and poverty alleviation through systematic resource management. With a focus on rapid response to disasters and emergencies through relief operations, the organization prioritizes marginalized segments of society such as the poor, women, and people living in remote mountainous regions-empowering and enabling them to participate in mainstream development processes.

Most members of QAFELA's Board of Governors, and General Body bring rich experience from reputable national and international organizations. The NGO also has a pool of skilled and dedicated workers specializing in social mobilization, community development, livelihoods, emergency response, conflict resolution, and the management of social sector development projects. Its multi-disciplinary team of professionals is governed by a Board of Governors, which serves as the policy-making forum for the organization.

The team is led by a highly experienced Chairman of the Board of Governors, who has held senior management positions in national and international organizations such as SRSP and the SDC-funded Kalam Integrated Development Project of Inter-Cooperation Switzerland. He has received training in development from institutions in Europe and the United States. In recognition of his contributions, he has been awarded the Ashoka Fellowship and the title of Global Goodwill Ambassador. The Chairman is supported by an Executive Director, a Director of Operations, and Program Managers.

The Executive Director of QAFELA has extensive experience working with projects such as USAID's FATA LDP, the FAO/ERRA Livelihoods Rehabilitation Project, IRC Pakistan, EIROP Composite Training Program, PPTA for FRDP, DFID's Pakistan Participatory Poverty Assessment, PCP, and the SDC/IC-supported Kalam Integrated Development Project. He also has international experience in Doha, Qatar. He leads the NGO's team in program planning, implementation, monitoring and evaluation, coordination, and donor reporting. He also convenes meetings of the Board of Directors as needed to seek approval of organizational policies.

Supporting the Executive Director, a Director of Operations Overseeing daily operations, field activities managing programs, budgets, and compliance, leading staff,

Project management Coordination, reporting while two Program Managers handle project planning, development, and field operations. The NGO team also includes office staff, field staff, and a Legal Advisor.

The dedicated members of QAFELA's support group bring a diverse range of expertise and qualifications to the organization, carefully developed through years of hands-on work, academic research, and practical experience in the dynamic field of social development. This collective knowledge equips the team to address a wide spectrum of challenges and opportunities within the development sector.

Staff has been hired, project has been launched, and classes have been started in most of the schools assigned to QAFELA and Falcon College of Nursing & Health Sciences.

The initial progress towards targets achievement indicate that the project is going to be successful very soon and the two main objectives mentioned above are going to be achieved before the deadline.

APPROACH, STRATEGY, AND ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE:

QAFELA adopts an approach that focuses on local community participation and has been proven successful. The organization believes that development succeeds when everyone works together. Therefore, QAFELA engages local people and organizations in a structured and coordinated way. It motivates communities at the village and local level to manage their own work, make the best use of their resources, and become self-reliant for sustainable development.

To achieve this, QAFELA establishes different organizations, such as Village Organizations (VOs) for men, Women's Organizations (WOs) for women, Volunteer Network Forums (VNFs), and Community-Based Organizations (CBOs). One prominent example of these CBOs is WOVEN (Women of Vision Empowerment Network), a strong network led by women. Through these organizations, local people actively participate in reducing poverty, improving social services, and amplifying the voices of marginalized groups. This

participation spans every stage of development-from identifying needs and decision-making to implementing actions.

In every area where QAFELA works, it strengthens local organizations so they can address community issues themselves. These smaller organizations are further linked into networks at the union council, tehsil, and district levels. At the district level, these organizations collectively form QAFELA's General Body and play an important role in decision-making through majority votes.

To increase community resilience against natural disasters, QAFELA has established volunteer groups, especially in Upper Swat. These volunteers are considered the organization's greatest asset and maintain a strong sense of ownership toward QAFELA.

QAFELA also values coordination and collaboration with government and non-government stakeholders, considering it a foundation of its success. Many of its projects have been successfully completed through partnerships with diverse organizations.

Within the organization, clear policies and strategies guide work, including a Human Resources Strategy, Gender Policy, Environmental Policy, Communication Strategy, Social Protection Policy, Program Strategies, and Project Exit Policy. The reporting structure is as follows: project staff report to their respective Project Managers, Project Managers report to the Director Operations, and the Director Operations reports directly to the Executive Director and the Chairman of the Board of Governors. The Executive Director receives policy guidance directly from the Board of Governors.

The Chairman of the Board is a distinguished development professional, widely recognized for visionary leadership and extensive national and international experience. With expertise spanning community development, gender mainstreaming, capacity building, governance, project management, social mobilization, and education, the Chairman brings invaluable knowledge and strategic direction to the organization.

Management of Low performing Government Primary Schools in District Buner and District Swat of the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Province of Pakistan

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Diya Rural Health Center (DRHC)

A project of Quick -Change Association for Educational Promotion, Livelihood Development and Awareness (QAFELA) for provision of basic health Services.

Embarking on a journey towards excellence, the Diya Rural Health Center (DRHC) emerges as a beacon of hope in the realm of healthcare. This establishment stands as a distinctive medical center, featuring a remarkable array of ten beds deeply rooted within the community. Unlike conventional hospitals, it derives its vitality not solely from government funding but from the collective strength of the community and (Quick-Change Association for Educational promotion, Livelihood Development & Awareness (QAFELA)).



The heartbeat of this healthcare sanctuary is its bustling Outpatient Department (OPD), where the dedicated medical staff tirelessly tend to the medical needs of approximately 100 patients every day. These compassionate healthcare professionals, who are part of the Diya Rural Health Center (DRHC) family, exemplify unwavering commitment to the welfare of their community.

Within the hallowed walls of this medical haven, a diverse range of facilities awaits those in need. Medical experts, including doctors, gynecologists and Paramedical staff, stand ready to provide their expertise. A well-equipped labor room ensures safe deliveries, and a pharmacy brimming with essential medicines is always on hand. For those requiring more in-depth assessments, ultrasound services are readily available. A 10-bed ward caters to both males and females, ensuring comfortable recuperation. In times of crisis, the emergency dispensary comes to the rescue, and for diagnostic insights, the laboratory is fully equipped.

Diya Sehat Card:

A remarkable initiative, the Diya Sehat Card, seeks to provide healthcare access to all, regardless of their economic circumstances. Within this initiative, a single card is issued to each family, enrolling all its members for a one-year period. The benefits bestowed by the Diya SehatCard span two categories:

Category A: For families in marginalized and underprivileged circumstances, including disabled widows, Orphans and those in dire economic conditions, all medical treatments are extended free of charge. This compassionate gesture ensures that the most vulnerable members of society receive the care they deserve, without the burden of medical expenses.

Category B: Category B participants are required to complete an annual registration process, ensuring the sustainability of this noble endeavor. Subsequently, they are entitled to an array of benefits, including complimentary delivery services, doctor consultations, ultrasounds, and access to existing medicines. Furthermore, a 50% discount is extended for diagnostic tests, lightening the financial load for those in need.



Registration Process:

To avail these benefits, a nominal monthly fee of 250 rupees is levied for registration. This modest sum contributes to the continued operation of Diya Rural Health Center (DRHC) and allows the program to serve an ever-expanding circle of beneficiaries.



Diya Community Boards:

Transparency and accountability are at the core of Diya Rural Health Center (DRHC) ethos. To ensure these values are upheld, two boards have been established, representing the eight union councils in Bahrain. These boards consist of individuals with a diverse range of experiences, renowned figures in their respective fields, hailing from various walks of life, and, significantly, comprising local residents. The two boards, one for men's

(25 members) and one for women (15 members), each led by a Chairman/Chairperson and Vice Chairman/Chairperson.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE /RELIEF AND WELFARE:

QAFELA has proactively established a Coordination & Facilitation Center dedicated to providing relief and rehabilitation services to the beleaguered communities affected by the devastating floods 2022, in Tehsil Behrain, Swat District. This hub serves as a pivotal point for orchestrating and facilitating relief efforts, ensuring a well-organized response to the crisis.

Empowering Affected Families: QAFELA's commitment to uplifting those affected by calamities is exemplified through their financial support. They have disbursed a substantial sum of Rs. 225,000 among 45 flood-impacted families residing in Union Council Balakot Cham Gharai, extending a much-needed lifeline to these households in their time of need. Additionally, Rs. 54,000 has been compassionately distributed among 13 families within the Chail Dipu Union Council Bashigram, reaffirming their dedication to alleviating the distress of those facing the brunt of natural disasters.

These endeavors underscore QAFELA's unwavering dedication to emergency response, relief, and the welfare of communities in crisis. Through their organized relief efforts and financial support, they aim to provide solace and resilience to the lives disrupted by adversity.'



DISTRIBUTION OF HYGIENE KITS:

QAFELA, a compassionate organization, carried out a significant humanitarian mission in Union Council Madyan, Tehsil Behrain, Swat District. They distributed carefully curated hygiene kits to orphaned and vulnerable students, containing items like soap and toothbrushes. This act aimed to improve hygiene and boost the recipients' self-esteem. QAFELA's initiative demonstrates their commitment to social responsibility and shows that small acts of kindness can create positive change. It brings hope and care to the children of Madyan, Tehsil Behrain, and the wider Swat District, promising a healthier and more secure future.



Distribution of Cash Grants among Flood affected People of Tehsil Behrain, Swat

With the support of International Development and Relief Foundation (IDRF) & British Colombia Muslims Association (BCMA) Canada. QAFELA distributed Cash amount of PKR 02 million among the flood-affected poor households at Villages Cham Gharai, Ingarabad, Jopin, Behrain, and Kiwa Mankyal, who found themselves in the dire grip of devastation following the catastrophic floods of 2022.

The selection criteria for disbursement were meticulously crafted, with emphasis placed on aiding those households whose homes had been tragically washed away, leaving them in a state of utter vulnerability. This initiative proved to be a beacon of hope for those poor households who had lost everything.



The distribution ceremony, an event of great significance, took place at the Madyan Hotel, serving as a testament to the unity and resilience of these communities in the face of adversity. It was an occasion marked by warmth and support, as 100 deserving households of the poorest of the poor people who had lost their houses in the floods received the much-needed financial assistance that helped them in rebuilding their livelihood.



Free Medical Camps in District Swat:

QAFELA has been regularly organizing free medical camps in several far-flung communities of district Swat. To date, QAFELA has organized one hundred such free health camps and has treated more than a thousand patients facing various diseases.

Distribution of NFIs among the flood affected people:

QAFELA has distributed NFIs among the flood affected people in upper Swat. This intervention was aimed at enabling the beneficiaries to cope with severe cold weather in the hilly areas of Swat during winter.

Relief to IDPs from Swat:

QAFELA took an active part in the relief operations for the internally displaced population of District Swat and distributed NFIs among the IDPs in Nowshera and Marndan. QAFELA has also distributed food items among the flood affected people of Bashigram, Madyan and Tirat upper Swat with the support of Anatolian Development Foundation and Human Appeal International.

Research & Advocacy:

QAFELA has established a Research and Advocacy wing to conduct research, explore the gaps and conduct advocacy to minimize or eliminate the gaps.

Education:

QAFELA has been supporting several orphans in Upper Swat in access to quality education. Awareness campaigns are being undertaken to create awareness about education and especially female education among the backward communities in District Swat.

Strengthening of Social Capital:

QAFELA has been mobilizing communities, organizing them into grass root organizations of men and women, networking the organizations on village and supra village levels and building the capacity of the organizations and their networks. QAFELA has facilitated the formation of 100 plus organizations in District Swat so far and has affiliated more than 100 existing organizations in the district. Their strengthening is one of the ongoing activities of QAFELA.

QAFELA plans to replicate the same model in the other districts in future.

Education Support through Scholarships

QAFELA successfully completed a landmark collaboration with Falcon College of Health Science, Madyan Swat, which became a cornerstone in its mission to promote education and empower marginalized communities in Upper Swat. This initiative was designed to break barriers for young people from disadvantaged backgrounds by providing them access to quality education and skill development opportunities.

Through this partnership, QAFELA extended 50% scholarships to deserving students belonging to economically challenged families. The scholarship program was carefully structured to address diverse educational needs and provide opportunities in multiple disciplines.

Under this project:

- 100 students successfully completed the Pharmacy Category B program (2 years), gaining vital professional qualifications in the health sector.
- 50 students completed the Ultrasound program (6 months), enhancing healthcare capacity in their local communities.
- 50 students graduated from the Diploma in Information Technology (DIT, 1 year) program, equipping them with market-driven digital skills.
- 50 students completed the Certificate in Information Technology (CIT, 6 months) program, opening doors to entry-level employment and entrepreneurship.
